Description

The study of health care work and organizations was a defining feature of the founding of medical sociology. Today these studies cover a range of organizational settings, are published in a wide variety of outlets, and use multiple theoretical and methodological approaches to develop knowledge. This is a survey course of the variety of ways students may think about the role of work and organizations in their medical sociology projects. At the conclusion of the course, students will be able to:

- Describe multiple approaches to studying health care work and organizations.
- Identify ways that organizations and work matter for a variety of medical sociology topics.
- Synthesize literature to forward students' own medical sociology projects.

Course Format

Readings will be assigned for each class period. Students are expected to review all materials before class. Three times throughout the semester, each student will be a discussion leader and work as part of a group of 2-3 to develop discussion notes and questions. A template for the notes is available on Canvas. Additionally, each student will work with me to define the main deliverable for the course, in accordance with their stage of the program and individual needs. We will meet one-on-one during Week 2 to discuss deliverables and then again in Week 9 to check on progress. Students will present their projects and progress during the final class period and submit the agreed upon deliverable for their final grade.
